> British Airways and Heathrow have announced a new partnership with the London Wildlife Trust to help protect local wildlife and ensure Hillingdon residents are able to enjoy the abundance of wildlife that surrounds them.

British Airways and Heathrow are jointly investing in the project, called 'Connecting with Nature in Hillingdon', which will help protect and enhance seven nature reserves and country parks in the

Hillingdon area. They include Minet Country Park, Cranford Country Park, Huckerby's Meadows, Yeading Brook Meadows, Ten Acre Wood, Gutteridge Woods, and Ickenham Marsh.

The project will also create volunteering opportunities in the community and build on the great work Hillingdon Council and the Trust are doing to ensure all corners of the community can access and enjoy the green spaces in their local area.

Hillingdon has many natural gems where residents and visitors can discover the likes of kingfishers and kestrels along the green lifeline of the Yeading Brook and Crane River.

Conservation work will be delivered with the expertise of London Wildlife Trust and include cattle grazing, path and fence maintenance, habitat restoration and new planting, as well as wildlife surveying.

To monitor progress, a ranger will be recruited to work closely with volunteers to look after the sites, and recruitment for these opportunities will open shortly. Regular events including guided walks and outdoor learning will also be organised, to help reconnect residents.

Connecting communities to the World of Work

Anypiring The Next Generation

The Heathrow Employment and Skills Academy is pleased to report that throughout this academic year, the Heathrow World of Work programme has delivered more than 4,000 experience of work days to schools in the local area. This has been accomplished through youth-targeted programmes for pupils in primary schools through to university students, and includes workshops, work experience, T-Level placements, and behind-the-scenes tours. Heathrow World of Work aims to build the skills and confidence of young people through real experiences of work, so they can unlock jobs and careers at the airport.

Heathrow Young Explorers and Innovators

In our local primary school workshops, pupils designed a sustainable transport solution for the airport and then presented their ideas, building on their essential skills.

Pupils worked in groups of three to create their design, utilising 3D software and honing their presentation skills as they competed to design the most innovative transport solution.

As Heathrow Explorers, they came up with design ideas for a transport solution that will make travel throughout the airport even more sustainable.

The challenge provided an enjoyable way for students to explore roles at the airport while developing the core Heathrow World of Work skills.

T-Levels

Our Tech team helped two students complete their T-Level placement over a 9-week period, and the Education & Skills team has just begun the next cohort with three additional students who have finished their initial 5-week placement . They will be back in January to complete their final four weeks.

DofE celebration

In February, we delivered a celebration event for students from three local secondary schools who were working towards their Duke of Edinburgh Award. 43 students attended the event which included workshops, business challenges and meeting colleagues from across Heathrow Airport.



This provided them insight into the vast range of careers and opportunities at the airport, and we received positive feedback from the students.

- 90% of students who attended gained a better understanding of the operation at Heathrow airport
- 90% of students who attended now have a good awareness of the different job roles at Heathrow

We had eight colleagues who volunteered from across the business to deliver the 'Listen without Limits' sessions, where students had the chance to ask questions about their roles at Heathrow, and Heathrow colleagues had the chance to ask students about their opinions on future career prospects.

Virtual Work Experience

This year over 4,000 local young people signed up for our virtual work experience initiative, which allowed them to complete online modules created to pique their interest in a job at the busiest airport in the UK. Business, IT, marketing, construction, and engineering were all options. 17 Heathrow colleagues and Team Heathrow partners presented online webinars where they discussed their professional backgrounds, the work they do at Heathrow, and how they all work together to keep Heathrow operating. Participants also received an employability masterclass to cap off the programme, which covered interview preparation, how to create a CV, and how to apply for jobs at the airport.



Engineering Insights

Working alongside the Engineering team, the Employment & Skills Team delivered three Engineering Insights weeks for students in the local area. This programme is an excellent opportunity for young people to learn about the world of engineering at Heathrow and encourages them to apply to Heathrow's apprenticeship and graduate programmes.

The Education & Skills team hosted 13 college students in October, 11 school/college students in February, and 28 university and college students studying engineering degrees in July. February also saw our first ever all-female cohort, and in July we had a 50/50 split of young men and women completing the programme.

During their Insights weeks, students had the opportunity to explore and learn about a variety of engineering career options at Heathrow covering civil, electrical and mechanical engineering. As they visited sites such as the pods workshop, airside terminals and water services, students were able to observe and understand the technical needs of each area, and they soon realised just how different and varied engineering can be and how no two days are ever the same!

In between visits, the students also received tips for CV writing as well as mock interviews, they met with engineering staff and completed apprenticeship tests.

These Insights weeks could not have gone ahead without the collaborative support of many teams across the airport, and we have received some great feedback from students with many of them keen to join either our Engineering Graduate Programme or our Engineering Apprenticeship Scheme in the future. Operational Update

Summer gets off to a great start!

Great service and resilient demand drive a strong start to 2023 – our teams welcomed 37 million passengers in the first half of 2023, which included some of the busiest days on record. We are giving great passenger service, with almost all passengers waiting less than five minutes at security as the summer peak gets underway. Overall passenger numbers still remain consistently below pre-pandemic levels, and the cost-of-living crisis is a material headwind for demand in the second half of the year.

Connecting all of Britain to global growth – passengers can choose from over 225 destinations this summer, as airlines add more routes and frequencies to their Heathrow networks. Loganair has taken advantage of our lower domestic charges to increase routes, and 12 UK airports are now connected to the UK's hub airport. Heathrow remains the best gateway in Europe for flights to the US, with 248 daily flights to 31 US destinations, and is currently better connected to India and China than European hub competitors.

Losses halved to £139 million – adjusted losses before tax narrowed to £139 million in the first half, but we remain loss-making due to the CAA setting too low a revenue allowance in the H7 regulatory settlement to generate enough cashflow, and this has been appealed. Our balance sheet is strong with gearing well below pre-pandemic levels and £4bn of liquidity, sufficient to cover all of our commitments for at least the next 24 months. We are not forecasting any dividends in 2023.



LEADING AIRPORT BOSS APPOINTED AS NEW CEO

The Board of Heathrow Airport has confirmed the appointment of Thomas Woldbye, currently the boss of Copenhagen Airport, as the person to replace John Holland-Kaye when he steps down later this year after nearly 10 years in post.

Following an extensive recruitment process, Thomas emerged as the standout candidate among a pool of exceptional contenders both internally and from across the world.

Having served as the CEO of Copenhagen Airport since 2011, Thomas brings with him a wealth of experience and a proven track record as a CEO of a major airport championing passenger service, sustainability and growth.

The summer getaway has got off to a great start, thanks to planning and close collaboration with airlines and their ground handlers. I am immensely proud of what we have achieved as a team in the last nine years, transforming Heathrow into a world-class airport that Britain can be proud of. Heathrow is now a leader in sustainability, with a diverse culture that reflects our local community and can attract the best talent from around the world.

Operational Update

Heathrow Airspace Modernisation Update

We are coming to the end of Stage 2 of the formal airspace change process (CAP1616) to support the Government's national programme of airspace modernisation. At this early stage in the process, the purpose is to develop a comprehensive list of options for potential future flight paths and to undertake an initial assessment of them.

Our most recent round of stakeholder engagement concluded in July, where we informed community representatives of our approach to the initial appraisal of our options, and our process for shortlisting options following this assessment.

We submitted our Stage 2 documentation to the Civil Aviation Authority at the end of July for the Gateway assessment.

All of Heathrow's Stage 2 documents are publicly available to view on the CAA's <u>Airspace Change Portal</u>.

In Stage 3 the options will undergo further refinement and detailed appraisal before being taken to a public consultation. The technical work will focus on assembling full system options that combine arrivals and departure routes, and their integration into the wider airspace network.



We will continue to update our communities on our plans for consultation, to ensure there is plenty of time for everyone to have their say, and to have these views taken into account.

Cargo Wins the "Milk Run"!

After many years of work from colleagues across various departments we are delighted to announce a change to government policy regarding landside cargo movements otherwise known as "milk runs" at Heathrow and elsewhere in the UK.

Permitting these milk runs will reduce the number of vehicles required for landside deliveries and collections

between cargo handlers, allowing loads to be conveyed to or from different sheds to be carried on the same vehicle, rather than separate vehicles. This change will reduce handlers' and forwarders' resource requirements, improve efficiency, and crucially reduce the 2,250 daily movements on our landside road network, with the subsequent emissions, noise and local community benefits.

HEATHROW RUNWAY RESURFACING WORKS

Approximately every ten years, full-length resurfacing works take place on each of Heathrow's runways. The last time this was carried out was in 2013. The next resurfacing works for both runways are planned to commence on the evening of Sunday 3 September and will continue through to the end of summer 2025.

Because Heathrow is so busy, this work needs to take place at night. That will mean changes to our runway alternation pattern, particularly for night-time flights. Most aircraft flying after 10.30pm and before 6am will use a single runway while the resurfacing works take place overnight on the other runway.

The runway resurfacing will be conducted in phases, commencing on the southern runway and switching between the northern and southern runways over time. To find out more information, including how we plan to manage noise for residents, please click <u>here</u>.
